

Pension claims made by dependent parents of George F. Stanwood

George F. Stanwood was born 12 March 1841, likely in Hampden where the family resided in 1840, or in/near West Indian Township No. 2 (now known as Woodville), Penobscot, Maine, where George's grandfather Benjamin Stanwood, Jr. was a landowner in 1844.

On 21 August, 1862, George joined his brother as a private in Company A, 1st Maine Heavy Artillery, a unit noted by historians to have suffered one of the highest percentages of battle casualties of any Union regiment during the entire war. George was wounded by gunfire on 19 May, 1864, and died at a hospital in Washington, D.C. on the 25th day of June, 1864.

From the pension claims of Calvin and Bridget Stanwood (dependent parents of George), we learn that George's father, Calvin Stanwood, had been seriously injured and disabled about 1860 when he became entangled in the chain of a sled and was dragged a significant distance through the woods by oxen. George began supporting his parents by making shingles in exchange for pork, molasses, teas and other food items, and working on the "small" 100-acre family farm. When George enlisted as Union soldier, he gave the bounty to his parents, save \$20 which he kept, and sent them \$10/month from his wages. One can deduce he was a kind and caring young man.

After George's death, his mother Bridget first filed for a pension (certificate #106,590). When she died in 1881, Calvin then made a pension claim (certificate #198,917). These original documents, held at the National Archives and Records Administration in Washington, D.C., provide wonderful genealogical information. Thank you to John Bursley for the document photographs below and from which we learn the following:

- Calvin Stanwood and Bridget/Betsey McDermott were married 11 November 1832 by Rev. Father Welch in Brooklyn, NY.
- Bridget died 4 July 1881, and Rev. William E. Morse of Lincoln officiated at her funeral.
- The only property owned by Calvin Stanwood and recorded by the Penobscot County Registry of Deeds was the South half of Lot 32, purchased 27 Sep 1864 by quit claim deed from William B. Hayford. Lot 32 was formerly owned by Calvin's father, Benjamin Stanwood, who routinely mortgaged his properties. On 29 May 1857, Benjamin purchased back Lots 24, 25 and 32 from Nathaniel Swett.
- Calvin and Bridget's home was modest and "unfinished."
- Timothy Fuller was an important family friend, who not only "purchased" Lots 24, 25 and 32 from Benjamin Stanwood in 1855, but also witnessed Calvin's claim for pension on 1 Sept. 1888.
- Birth dates of George's sisters, Florence A. (b. 28 May 1849) and Eva E. (b. 29 April 1857)

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We James H Chesley and Dennis Jenkins residents of Woodville Maine on oath say that we have been well acquainted with Mrs Bridget Stanwood and her family and circumstances as to property and means of support for more than 15 years last past, having lived near her all that time - Mrs. Stanwood is a confirmed invalid and has been for more than 8 years last past - She has no property of any kind and no income - Her husband Calvin Stanwood is living with her but has been unable by reason of physical disability to support his family for about eight years last past - Previous to that time he was much out of health and at that time he was caught by the hook of an iron chain in the leg and the iron attached to the chain was run away dragging him through the woods a very ~~time~~ distance and severely injuring him so that since that time he has been unable to labor but very little, and is

Constantly troubled with lameness and pain in his limbs -

Mrs Stanwood's Son George F. Supported her and his said father in the following manner. For more than five years before he enlisted in the Army he worked out nearly all the time for wages at the Lumber business, devoting his earnings regularly and constantly for the support of his said mother and family by purchasing provisions, clothing and other family necessaries for them - When he did not work out, he labored on the farm at home, devoting his earnings in the same way - When he enlisted in the Army he paid to his said parents the Bounty received excepting \$20 which he retained - And he signed the allotment to his said mother of his wages \$10 per month, which was duly received by her and her husband - and was devoted to their support - Mr. Stanwood the father owns 100 acres of land in said Woodville, but not more than 25 acres cleared - The house

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is an unfinished one, and the whole is worth about \$400 not over that - This is all the real estate he owns - He has ^{two cows and} three yearlings worth about ^{one hundred} \$100 dollars - This is all the personal property he owns and he is owing about four hundred dollars which he has no means of paying outside of this property - Their said son was a very steady industrious young man and his labor was worth as much as the average of men, and we should say that more than three fourths of it was devoted to the support of his said parents and family regularly and constantly for more than three years before he enlisted in the Army -

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I, Stark Webster, of Mattawamkeag, County of Penobscot and State of Maine, of lawful age on oath do testify and say, I well knew George F. Stanwood, son of Calvin and Bridget Stanwood, previous to his enlistment in Military Service of the United States war of 1861. He entered said Service in Summer of 1862 in Co. "H" 1st M.C. Heavy Arty, Vols., and died in said Service, and ~~in 1864 at the battle of the Clouds on the 10th of August 1864~~
deceased mother of our said son George F. At the time she was an applicant for pension. We tried to get a record of our marriage from Brooklyn but wholly failed to do so. We cannot find the said Rev. Father Welch and therefore could not then and cannot now procure an affidavit from him as officiating clergyman. There are no witnesses to the ceremony now living to my knowledge and as I verily believe, the number of my late wife's pension certificate was 106,096. My said son George F. is the person he represents himself to be, and who signed the above affidavit, and made oath to its truth. I am disinterested.

Vols. war of 1861; that the said George F. entered the military service of the United States in said organization on or about August 21st 1862, was wounded on or about May 19th and died from the effects of his wound on or about June 25th 1864; that said Calvin and his wife Bridget during said term of time lived together as husband and wife up to the time of said Bridget's death on July 4th 1881; that said Bridget at the time of her death was a pensioner as dependant mother of said Soldier George F. Stanwood, that for five years previous to said Soldier's enlistment he contributed the major portion of his earnings towards the support of his said parents, and upon entering said service he signed what were termed "Allotment Rolls", allotting the sum of ten dollars of his pay monthly to his father for his support, that ten

dollars a month of said soldiers wages so allotted was received by the father of said soldier up to the time of his said soldiers death, at the time before stated; that said Colvin Stanwood, is seventy three years of age, unable to perform manual labor, and is poor. He owns no real estate and all told not over two hundred dollars worth of personal

property. The little place where said Colvin Stanwood lives was owned by his late wife and is now the property of her children. This place is worth not exceeding four hundred dollars. The income derived or derivable from this place would not exceed one hundred dollars per annum. The income derived or derivable for the last twelve years, from the manual labor of said Colvin Stanwood would not exceed fifty dollars a year. His labor, for the period last named, has had no marketable value, but has consisted of a little light-work on and about the place where he has lived. He has and has had no other sources of income other than as expressed above. Said Soldier left no widow or minor children surviving him. Said Soldier George F. was born in March A.D. 1841. The nature of said Soldiers contributions to the support of his parents,

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previous to his enlistment in the service, were there. — He worked at home on the little farm then in the possession of his parents most of the time. Some of the time he worked out for wages and took his earnings home and turned them in to the support of his father's family. Some of the time he made rived shingles and sold them to the local trader for provisions for the family & his father —

All the blanks in this form should be carefully filled and the requirements of the notes strictly observed.
 An honorable discharge from the service in all cases is necessary.
 Declarations of claimants, either for original pension or for increase of pension already granted, must be made before a court of record, or before some officer thereof having custody of its seals; said officer being fully authorized and empowered to administer and certify any oath or affirmation relating to any pension or application therefor.
 The claimant's identity and loyalty must be proven by two witnesses, certified by the judicial officer to be respectable and credible, who are present and witness the signature of the declarant, and certify to his identity and loyalty under oath or affirmation.
 Declarations and other papers should be as legible and as clear in statement as possible.
 Where any evidence is already on file in any department of the Government, a definite description of and specific reference to it will render it available in any subsequent claim.
 The post office address (naming street and number in all large cities) of the applicant, attorney, and witnesses, should be embodied in or accompany every application, and all evidence in each claim; and each change of residence of said parties, while communicating with the Pension Office or the pension agents, should be stated.
 Pensions are, by law, exempted from any liability on account of the obligations of the pensioners, and no lien upon them can be recognized.
 All facts, testimony of which is required to establish a claim, must be proven by the affidavits of two or more credible witnesses unless other evidence is specified.
 The statements of claimants, unless duly corroborated, are not accepted as evidence.
 Testimony, in support of allegations made in a declaration, may be taken before any officer whose authority and signature are duly certified, and who shall disclaim any interest, direct or indirect, in the prosecution of the claim.
 Persons desiring to complete claims pending at the decease of the claimants, must furnish a duly verified certificate of their authority as heirs or legal representatives.
 With all claims for arrears, increase, or restoration to the rolls, the original pension certificate must be returned, or explanation of its absence must be given under oath.
 To facilitate the adjudication of claims, all the requisite evidence that is available should be forwarded with the application.
